



### Objectives:

1. To explore Children's Rights.
2. To understand everyone has the same rights.

### You will need:

Content	Activity	Time
Introduction	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▶ The Convention on the Rights of the Child is a list of rights specifically for children adopted by every country in the world except for the United States, Somalia and South Sudan.</li> <li>▶ The reason children have been given their own set of rights is because they are especially vulnerable to not having their human rights respected.</li> </ul>	5 mins
Video	Watch the 6 minute <a href="#">video</a> on The Convention of the Rights of the Child.	8 mins
Discussion	Ask children which rights they think are most important and why?	5 mins
Activity (Art)	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Hand out paper and ask children to outline their hands and cut them out</li> <li>2. Ask children to choose a right to put on their hand</li> <li>3. Decorate hands</li> <li>4. Printout the globe below and ask children to stick their hands around the globe.</li> </ol>	15 mins
Discussion	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▶ Why are rights important in their lives?</li> <li>▶ Why are they important to children around the world?</li> <li>▶ Remind children that no matter how different children may look on the outside, their rights are all the same.</li> </ul>	7 mins
At home	Ask children to talk about the activity at home and ask family members which right they think is most important.
